Words from our Nations

Croeso i'r 2023 Welcome to 2023

An exciting start to 2023, in the midst of a national transport strike we've had the Guildford International EVF Circuit event in January, where the members of BVF rose to the challenge of assisting the European fencers who ventured forth to Guildford to compete in transporting them to and from coach depots, hotels and airports.



Wales were well represented as part of the GBR contingent gaining medals in the following: Steven Bateman, Bronze ME Cat 1, Rob Brooks, Gold ME Cat 4, Margaret Myers, Gold WF cat 4, Bronze WS Cat 4, Nick Hill, Bronze MS Cat 2 (photo Nick Hill with his Bronze at his first EVF event) Carl Morris, Gold MS Cat 4.

Although fairly quiet on the general domestic fencing

front at the moment, Ceri Thomas and Lyn Robinson ventured into deepest France, Lille to be precise, to partake of proper croissants and pain au chocolate as well as a little fencing at the nominated EVF circuit event in Faches. Ceri, Duncan Rowlands and Tony Baston-Hall, amazingly managed it all in one day! As Ceri said, "I love it when plan comes together!" All that was missing was the cigar.

Ceri fought well in the poules and DEs, eventually falling to the eventual silver medallist to take a well fought for and deserved Bronze, a bottle of strong local beer and a very pungent block of local cheese.

and service, staying overnight and sharing with Caron Hale (apologies Caron for the snoring, I did warn you!). Whilst at the Welsh Closed Individuals Ruth Rowland & Lyn Robinson took bronze in the WF, and Lyn silver and Ruth bronze in the WS, with Catherine Bowd taking Bronze in the WE. In the Teams: The Wiley team of Nigel Betterton et al took Silver in the MF. Silver also for the WE team of Cath Bowd, Pam Fairweather, Clare King and a young addition, Amelia Cattenach. Plus, a bronze for the mixed sabre team of Dan Wide, Ruth Rowland and Lyn Robinson.

So, a good start to 2023 for the Welsh.

How wonderful it has been to see Veterans Fencing roaring back to life throughout Europe. Final figures are not in yet but we are already seeing record numbers of fencers participating in the Circuit Events and potentially also record numbers registering for the European Championships in Thionville in May.

European Circuit

The ever increasing numbers of fencers making the commitment to participate in the Circuit events is having an impact of the now very competitive European Rankings, where fencers are choosing to attend extra competitions in order to secure their position with a view to winning the 2023 Fencer of Year medal! Check your position in the rankings at:

We are still getting more inquiries from fencers outside Europe who want to participate as they recognise the opportunity to train and improve against those they will meet at the World Championships.

A special mention to Santander who hosted the Kyiv Epee event on behalf of our Ukrainian friends. They delivered a well run competition with a generous Ukrainian opening ceremony and much yellow and blue on display.

European Championships - Thionville

Only a couple of months away and preparations to welcome us all in France in May are full steam ahead – anticipating something in the region of 1,800 fencers, making it the biggest fencing competition in the World. Don't forget that seeding at the European Championships is based on the European rankings – its still not too late to get some more points!

EVF Congress

The EVF Congress will take place on the Tuesday before fencing starts in Thionville. Every country has a seat at the Congress for their representative and we will be voting on venues for 2026 and 2027 as well as announcing possible candidates for 2028 and beyond. We will also be announcing the European Circuit Events for the coming season.

John Mason will be stepping down as a Board Director at this Congress. John has made a quiet but significant contribution to EVF over many years – both with his technological contribution and his wise counsel in the background. He does not quite escape our clutches, however, as John will take on the role of Rankings Officer for EVF and will continue to support the work that we are doing with the rankings system, registration software etc. We are looking forward to working with him in his new role.

World Championship Changes

Since the last newsletter, the FIE Congress voted overwhelmingly in favour of the inclusion of the 40+ age groups at the Veteran World Championships. This was the culmination of many years of work and effort that I have personally given to this campaign so I am delighted that our V1 colleagues are finally to be included! There is a slight delay though, it has been decreed that this change will not be made until the 2025 World Championships. We have been patient for nearly 10 years so I guess we can wait another couple!

Tunisia has indicated that they are interested in hosting the World Championships in 2025 and they are keen to ensure that this 'experiment' is a great success. Even more satisfying is the adoption of the popular European approach to Teams with Veteran and Grand Veteran Teams replacing the current World Championship team format.

Looking forward

Standing still means falling behind and the small but hardworking Board of EVF is continually looking at ways we can ensure the best possible environment in which European Veteran Fencers can grow, thrive and compete.

With 3,500 followers on the EVF Facebook page we can distribute information and get feedback quickly and effectively. We are exploring ways in which coaches of veteran fencers can share and be supported. We are continually raising the standards of competition organisers to provide better venues and conduct of events. We are also looking at how para-fencing can be incorporated into our events.

I look forward to seeing many of you in Thionville and hope I will be handing medals to lots of GBR tracksuits on the podium.

The BVF is hosting a Silver Swords Spar Day on the 23rd April @ Manchester Fencing Centre 3-5pm. This event is aimed at beginners aged 40yrs and over who have completed an introductory fencing session. REPORTS FROM THE EVF CIRCUIT

Competing in the EVF Circuit Paul Baillache

MUNICH EVF CIRCUIT - DECEMBER 2022

Last December, 8 BVF fencers made their way to a snowy and festive Munich, to compete in the EVF Max Geuter Memorial Foil / Sabre circuit event.

The standard was very high - in the foil event apart from German fencers there were French, Italian, Israeli, Polish, Hungarian, and Croatian fencers. A great opportunity to fence some different and good fencers and learn. The entry numbers in foil were pretty good all round, comparable to or bigger than Guildford and the other circuit events, so it was worth making the trip. Sabre looked decent entries too.

The event was really well organised - the venue was nice and warm venue despite the snow and ice outside. The events finished in good time to allow travel back to the UK on the same day, or to spend an evening in Munich, though some of us suffered travel disruption from bad weather in UK.

Personally, it was the usual tale of could have, should have, didn't, but I learned a lot and enjoyed my trip, and I'll definitely return next year.

And special congratulations to Claudia, in her first international event, for winning pool fights and getting through her first DE round, before losing to the bronze medallist 10-6.









If you are interested in going to this event next year, it is very accessible. A budget hotel is only 200 yards from the venue, other hotels are within walking distance, and a metro stop is a short walk away which takes you to the airport or straight to the town centre, where all the Christmas festivities and restaurants are.

Munich was a great place to visit in December - lots of Christmas markets with the main one in the town square.



EVF Circuit – Foil/Sabre – Lille – January 2023

A record number of British fencers went to the Lille circuit event this year – 7 sabreurs, and 8 foilists, plus Richard Sage as our team supporter. Good to see so many first timers going to this event.

Sabre was on Saturday, and foil on Sunday. The afternoon start for some of the sabre, meant that one brave bunch of fencers did the event as a day trip from London - starting and finishing the day in your own bed, but fencing abroad in between, probably deserves its own medal.

Entry numbers were strong, in all but 70+, and the level of fencer attending was very high, and for men's foil in particular, some of the best European fencers were there. There was a new Cat 0 35+ for the ladies events – perhaps something we could consider to grow our membership now that 40+ fencing will soon be at the Worlds.

In MS V2 Ceri Thomas fenced really well winning a bronze medal, and in WS V3 Lyn Robinson also had a great day, getting a silver medal.



In MF V2, it was a strong field of 42 (!) fencers, with 8 of the top 15 ranked EVF fencers there . Paul Baillache went out in L64, Mike McKay in L32, Kola Abidogun in L16 unfortunately meeting Nick Mort, who fenced really well, making the L8.

In MF V3, another strong field with world and European medallists entered -John Troiano and Tony Bartlett both ranked well after the pools, with a bye past the L32, then winning their L16 fights, but unfortunately both went out in the L8 in two very close fights.

In Women's foil, all the age groups were combined, on the EVF handicap system, before going to separate DEs, where in WF V3 Lyn Robinson made L8, and Caron Hale took a bronze medal, her second in a row after Munich in December.



Special congratulations to our three medal winners Ceri Thomas, Lyn Robinson, and Caron Hale, who won not only a medal and a load of European ranking points, but a block of cheese and a bottle of pretty strong beer to enjoy on the way home.



For anyone interested in going next year, Lille is very easy to get to and is a nice city to spend some time in. The event was really well run, and on Sunday finished in good time for most of us to be back home by early evening.

And here are some thoughts from Lyn Robinson, who had a great time, attending for the first time:

"Getting to Lille was easy and good value for money considering the distance from my home in the Vale of Glamorgan just outside Cardiff. By booking well in advance I took advantage of a really cheap Eurostar ticket. Total travel cost including hotel was only £150 - I've spent more attending an event in Britain - it just required a little more forward planning.

Taking fencing kit on Eurostar gave me peace of mind travelling with my kit bag, and not finding that my kit bag hadn't made the journey at the airport luggage carousel. Passport control and security was easy to go through, with everything I needed in my fencing bag and a small rucksack. The hardest part was hefting my fencing bag onto the scanner.

Caron Hale joined me at St Pancras and we shared a room in Lille a short 10min walk from the Lille Eurostar station. We took a walk around Lille finding a lovely little local bistro where the food was delicious, reasonable and plentiful.

On Saturday for the WS Caron and I decided to walk to the venue, it was supposed to be a 30min walk but with Google maps being silly it actually took an hour, funnily enough on the walk back it did only take 30mins! On Sunday for the WF as check in was a lot earlier we took a 10min uber.

The event organisers had arranged free minibus transfers back to the Eurostar station after the conclusion of the WF event, we actually arrived 5 hours earlier than our planned Eurostar back to St Pancras and were allowed to board a much earlier train, which meant we arrived back in Britain well over 4 hours earlier than planned.

So, for anyone thinking of attending this event I would highly recommend it."

TOP TEN VETERANS IN WORLD & EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Vets who regularly take part in world and European championships may be interested to know who have been the most successful veteran fencers since



those championships began. Clear overall winner is the incomparable Marie Chantal Demaille of France, senior world champion in 1971, the first veteran women's foil world champion in 1998 and still winning medals last year at foil and epee, who has now amassed an extraordinary 40 gold medals – 23 world and 17 European titles – as well as 22 medals of another colour... so far. A long way behind but still hugely impressive come two fencers with more than 20 gold medals (Gari Aftandilov of Russia and Marja-Lisa Someroja of Finland), then a group of four with ten or more titles, (our own Janet Cooksey and Richard Cohen, Ludmila Chernova of Russia and Ute Wessel of Germany). Demaille is also the most successful

fencer at any one weapon – 18 foil titles – followed by Aftandilov with 15 also at foil.

Second only to Demaille among total number of medals won is Brigitte Greunke of Germany, who became the first European women's epee champion in 1999 and has collected more bronze (22) and silver (16) medals than anyone, but only eight golds. Third in quantity is Somoroja with 40 medals, 22 of them gold.

Some fencers have been particularly successful in world championships rather than European: Aftandilov has 11 world golds and five European; Cooksey has always reserved her best performances for the worlds, winning ten titles and four European; Someroja has so far won nine world gold medals, but only three European; Graham Paul has seven world titles and two European; Kerstin Palm of Sweden and Maurizio Galvan of Italy have each won six world championships, but never a European title.

For others it has been the other way round: Ute Wessel of Germany has won eight European titles, but only two world championships; Sylvia Brown has four European titles and one world; Connie Adam has won 17 European medals (three gold) in a remarkable fencing career starting when she was 60, but only one bronze at the world championships. Germany's Annemarie Grundlehner has 13 European medals, but nothing at world level.
