European Individual Championships, Thionville, France 17/21 May

Our squad of 140 plus fencers found their way by land and sea or air across the Channel to Thionville in the Benelux region of France to take part in the European Veterans Individual Championships. A Championships was a new experience for some and old hat for others, but the excitement and anticipation were tangible.

The venue and set up were excellent, in particular the live stream both showing on big screens at venue and accessible for those at home, and the slick opening ceremony and medal presentations. The standard and quality of fencing was very high, with fencers obviously having trained hard for this event and the standard of refereeing was very good. There were no easy matches, some with very close DE results, and we returned home with a very respectable total of 11 medals finishing 4th on the medal table out of 33 countries.

Being a Vet by Lisa Drage

I should have realised I'd end up fighting with swords when, at a very young age my mother enrolled me into ballet because I spent my days running around with a mini wooden sword chasing my big brother. It will come as no surprise that ballet didn't last too long!

My next foray into sword fighting came at University in the early 80s where I was persuaded to pick up a foil and I happily barrelled rather wildly down the piste at unsuspecting opponents oblivious to the finer art I was missing and was therefore content to lay down my arms after a couple of years when I graduated and moved on with life and my career.

Roll forward 35 years, and I saw an advertisement for a Bryant Blades course at my son's school. I wasn't convinced my knees were up to the task, but I turned up, the eldest by some margin and after a few sessions fell very much in love with the sport. This was in late 2017, and we were actively encouraged to start entering competitions straight away.


My first comp was the Cambridge Winter Open, where Fiona Turnbull promptly dispatched me by 15-0. Likewise, the Invicta Open where Gillian Worman sent me packing. Undeterred I won the Herts Novice and then Senior Opens and then fought hard for a bronze at the Eastern Region Championships in 2018. This gained me a place on Vets Eastern Team for the Winton Cup. It was a daunting experience, losing ALL my fights over both days. I was blown away by the support and encouragement however and was determined to keep developing my skills and set myself a rather ambitious target of Vets GBR selection.

Retirement from the corporate world facilitated my ability to increase my training and I started to pick my competitions more selectively, and entered my first Vets comps, coming last in the Hampshire Vets, National Championships and Age Groups. Then Covid paid a visit and put paid to our comps along with group training. I was fortunate to have a gym to work out and practice footwork etc during the long lockdowns. Once the world reopened, I moved to St Albans FC and Hitchin FC, increasing my fencing sessions to 3 and then 4 a week, linking up with Laura Delaney as coach and enjoying the support all offered. As a fencer you are nothing without the people


Travelling nigh on 300 miles a week for training 4, sometimes 5 times a week is a huge commitment, but I'd set myself a target and was absolutely focused on achieving my goal, whilst still enjoying my life (and the odd glass of wine obviously!).

In April 2022 I received a surprise call to represent England in the Home International as a previously selected fencer had succumbed to Covid. Being part of the England team was a


